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Peabody's Krutka working to advance coal, reduce emissions

Peabody's engagement strategy includes supporting our social license to operate and advocating for favorable energy policies and advances in technologies related to the use of coal. For Holly Krutka, Peabody's Vice President of Coal Generation & Emissions Technology, the strategy is well aligned with her extensive technical experience and background.

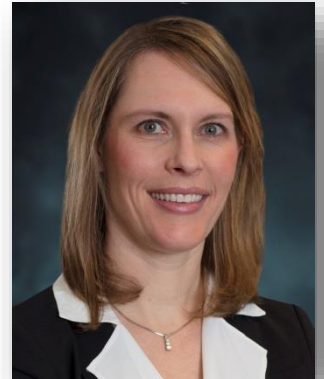
As an industry expert on clean coal technologies like high-efficiency, low-emissions power plants and carbon capture and storage, Holly serves in a leadership role in several industry groups and research organizations that aim to maximize opportunities for the development and deployment of new clean coal technologies. "We want to make it viable for power plants to reduce their environmental footprint, effectively respond to regulations and use our product over the long term," said Holly, who holds a doctorate in chemical engineering.

There are hurdles limiting power plant development in the U.S., and Holly's task is to engage, educate and actively influence policy and technology development and deployment to offset those challenges. For example, Peabody played an important role in the broad, bipartisan coalition that advocated for U.S. Congress to strengthen and extend 45Q tax credits to help advance carbon capture and storage projects in America.

"Through the use of technology, we can advance the use of coal and at the same time reduce emissions," said Holly.

At the request of the federal government, Holly carried this message to last fall's COP23 conference in Bonn, Germany, where she conveyed the importance of an "all of the above" energy strategy to meet the world's needs for energy security, economic progress and environmental solutions.

Holly offers technical support for Peabody's involvement in global industry associations and serves as Co-chair of the Carbon Utilization Research Council (CURC), a group advocating advanced technologies supporting coal. She is also Chair of the Coal Policy Committee for the National Coal Council, a federal advisory committee to the U.S. Secretary of Energy.
